We all need reminders of God's presence, grace, and guidance along the way. Every once in a while, I get one of those "perspective" moments—moments when you can see how far you have come by the grace of God, relish the goodness of the present, and lean into a future God will channel and guide like the mighty flow of a majestic stream.

One of those "perspective" moments came to me a couple of weeks ago as I rediscovered my college Bible. I purchased it at the beginning of my sophomore year as the specific version of the Bible required by a religion professor. As I thumbed through the pages, memories flooded back to me. I remembered that in August 1981, I wrote a letter to God, surrendering to my call to ministry. I discovered notes in the margins of the Bible that reminded me of my growing awareness of the Biblical message. What really struck me most was the collection of Upper Room devotional pages torn out and stuck into my Bible on specific dates. It was daily markers of progress in a long journey. Each one is a marker of my growing desire to know, love, and serve God, and to mature as a person and Christian disciple. Each one was a message from God to a young sojourner. I remember how I tore out and kept the ones that really "spoke" to me.

One little hand-scribbled note was a devotional I gave to an unfortunate UMW group in Kannapolis, North Carolina. (Long story—it involved a girl and a seminary). Not long after my workmates at Kroger told me I wasn't "preacher material," my mentor at school sent me to talk to his minister, a Duke Divinity graduate. I met with him and he had some wisdom to share and put in a plug for Duke. Meanwhile, in the summer of '81, before I purchased my new study Bible, I met a girl in Florida—a good Methodist girl who lived in Kannapolis, NC not far from Duke. In February of the next year, 1982, with study Bible in hand, I decided to make a holy pilgrimage to see the seminary ... and the girl. She asked me to speak to her Grandmother's UMW. I did. I still remember the stunned look on their faces as I wrapped up my devotional from the hand-written note in my study Bible—in three minutes flat! Two thoughts: maybe I really wasn't preacher material ... and I did eventually find more things to say—as evidenced by how many of you wish on Sunday morning for the brevity of my youth! I discovered on that pilgrimage that everything is not what it appears. I stayed with the girl's pastor, who was an Asbury Seminary graduate. The preacher and the girl refused to take me to Duke. They literally said if I went to Duke Divinity School I was hell bound! In fact, they gathered around me, laid hands on me, and prayed that I would see the light and go straight to Asbury. The seminary visit didn't work out—and neither did the girl! It all scared hell right out of me—and I wound up going to Vanderbilt Divinity School in my stunned, disoriented state, ironically, which many consider the gate to hell.

What is my point? My old college Bible has stories to tell. Stories of my life. Stories of my budding faith. Stories of my desire to obey and serve God. Almost forty years later, I see with amazed perception and prospective that all are stories of grace—the flow of God's continual loving action in my life—and in yours. In our present circumstances, I hope God grants you "perspective" moments. Moments when you can see how far you have come by the grace of God, relish the goodness of the present, and lean into a future God will channel and guide like the mighty flow of a majestic stream.



LIVING THROUGH THE STORM

Here in Cookeville "living through a storm" is how many have described the past few months. Anna (17) and Audrey Kate (11) Hale truly have lived through a storm. The March 2 tornado traveled through their neighborhood. Anna and Audrey Kate were witnesses to this amazing act of nature, but even more impressive is the memory they have of how their parents, first mentors and models of discipleship, did not question how to react. When parents Jason and Michelle Hale were asked how they managed to rally so quickly Michelle said, "That's what we do. We were safe and there was no time to question what had happened. Making sure everyone else was safe was what we were called to do." Weeks later, in the midst of the Stay at Home order, distance learning, and COVID-19 pandemic, Shannon Auberson, Director of Children and Families, interviewed Anna Hale to see how they were weathering this new storm.

Tell me your thoughts about worshiping from home on Sunday morning?

It's very different. I definitely miss our little balcony crew and seeing everyone's reactions to the sermon, music, etc. and there's something about getting ready and putting on our "Sunday best" that I miss.

Give me one positive and one negative of this experience.

A positive is definitely the beautiful weather and having more time to spend with family. One negative is continuing to see debris from a month ago, along with occasional battles with survivor's guilt and knowing it could've been us.

What is your biggest fear?

Leaving someone on a bad note. After a tragic event that took lives in seconds, I often find myself afraid of not appreciating people enough or saying the wrong things at the end of a conversation because you never know what could be your last.

What is your biggest hope?

I'm hoping for a sense of normalcy. I know with the tornado, and now the pandemic, that nothing will be exactly the same, but I'm just waiting for everything to calm down and reach the new normal.

How has Staying at Home helped you prioritize the most important things in your daily life's routine? Being at home has really pushed me to focus on spending time with family and self-care. I think we often get so caught up in work/school. I know I do. We forget to cherish the simple things. So having coffee with my mom in the mornings, or sitting at the dinner table and laughing with my family, are just some of the little things I prioritize now.

Do you see yourself slowing down to enjoy family and friends more once our routines return?

For sure. I try to make family and friends a priority, but again, schedules around here are tough sometimes. But with these recent events, I think everyone knows the importance of spending more time with people close to them.

FOOD PANTRY

God's Grace Food Pantry is still in operation. We are adhering to the safe practices of social distancing, which makes this ministry look extremely different. Our guests are important to us, and we miss seeing them on a weekly basis. As brothers and sisters in Christ, we value their safety and wellbeing and also long to help them meet their basic needs.

This is new territory for all of us. Our Pantry team discussed several options and decided on the appointment system. This is similar to a plan used in many pantries in our area and across the country. We speak with the guest by phone and discuss their needs, which allows us the opportunity to create a box specifically for their family. Just prior to their pickup appointment time, the box is set outside the door. While this may appear impersonal, Tamika is able to wave through the window and offer signs of peace and encouragement. We are also including a note with a scripture and devotion.

Meanwhile, it's time to make plans for the future. We anticipate a growing need for our pantry and want to be prepared. We are discussing ways we can help Second Harvest by packing emergency boxes for their warehouses and our pantry. As this COVID-19 emergency continues, we will explore other ideas and ways we can be most helpful to our community. Stay tuned for updates during these ever-changing times. We place our hope and faith in God, who sustains us as we continue to fulfill our calling to share the story of grace in the heart of town.
