#### A MESSAGE FROM OUR SENIOR PASTOR

Being new here as your new pastor has caused me to reflect on how I get started in new appointments. Job number one is learning people's names and faces. It is a challenge, but a very enjoyable challenge. Learning about one another and forming a relationship is one of the best gifts of being a new pastor.

As I reflect on my process of starting in a new place, I realize my pattern is to help a congregation clarify its mission and vision—and then align to that mission and vision. Our God-given mission or purpose is to make disciples of Jesus Christ. Disciples are students who learn to imitate their role model. Our role model is Jesus. So, discipleship is our primary focus. We are to become transformed transformers of the world. That is our mission.

Mission leads to vision. What is the picture of God's preferred future for us—as those beloved disciples of Jesus who gather as Cookeville First United Methodist Church? What does fulfilling our mission look like for us—in the context of who we are, our history and heritage, and our specific "mission field"—which is our community? We must discern what that picture looks like and then live into it fully.

I have been working with our staff and transition team to "refresh" our vision as a church. The key elements of the vision here are discipleship, story and grace. We all have our own personal story within the larger story of God. The more we understand our personal story and participate in writing God's larger story, the more we thrive as human beings and the more reflective of the nature of God we become. In short, we are empowered and led in a journey of transformation where we begin to mature toward deeper connection with God through Christ and imitation of Christ's character. The content of our shared story is *grace*.

Grace is God's continual presence and activity flowing from God's constant *steadfast love*. Grace is a distinctively Wesleyan and Methodist theme. As Ephesians 2:8 says, "We are saved by grace—through faith..." That's our larger story. That's how our personal story is transformed. That's our story to be shared. So discipleship, story and grace our crucial for us.

What remains in the process of clarifying mission and vision is aligning to the vision and then building unity and momentum. Unity and momentum as a church is so important today. It's like being completely in sync with God and one another. Our community and world need that. My sister-in-law and her husband recently traveled to the Smokies to see the fireflies that light up in sync with one another. They are drawn to each other's light—and before long all the fireflies are in sync with a shared "blink" of light. That's a good image for a church that is in sync, unified and gaining momentum in our shared life and mission. I look forward to writing our next chapters together!

#### REPORT OF 2019 ANNUAL CONFERENCE

The 52nd Tennessee Annual Conference was held June 12 -14 at Brentwood UMC. The business of the conference is conducted by equal numbers of clergy and lay members. Our congregation sent two clergy and two lay members to annual conference. Rev. Conrad is still a member of the Memphis Conference, so although he attended the Tennessee Annual Conference, he was unable to vote this year. Rev. Rob Wheeler is our other clergy member. Jason Hicks and Teena King were this year's Lay Members to Annual Conference. Per Elmore and Faith Holdrege were the alternate Lay members to Annual Conference. The theme of this year's conference was Remembering Who We Are Through Word, Water and Witness. We gather once a year for worship, fellowship, and study, and to conduct the business of the conference. Details of the conference are available on the Tennessee Annual Conference website tnumc.org.

Holy Conferencing was begun by John Wesley at the Christmas Conference of 1784, when the Methodist Episcopal Church in America was formed. And since then Annual Conferences worldwide meet yearly.

Each year at annual conference we license persons to be local pastors; commission provisional members who have completed seminary and are on track to become elders and deacons; and ordain elders and deacons in full connection. We remember those who have gone on to life eternal, and the retiring class of clergy pass the mantle to the incoming class of clergy. This year Adam Daniels was licensed as a first time Local Pastor.

The day begins with worship and then we move on to the business before the body. Again, reports, resolutions, delegate elections, awards can all be found on the Tennessee Annual Conference website.

The next General Conference will be held May of 2020. The Tennessee Annual Conference elected delegates for that meeting and for the Southeast Jurisdictional conference will be held in July 2020. Both of these conferences meet every four years (a quadrennium). The Tennessee Annual Conference sends four clergy and four lay delegates to General Conference is where the business of the entire United Methodist Church worldwide is conducted. We send four clergy and four lay delegates to the Southeast Jurisdictional Conference. The business of Jurisdictional Conferences is to elect and appoint bishops who will be serving in their respective jurisdictions. The first two Jurisdictional delegates serve as reserve delegates for general conference. Two additional clergy and lay persons are elected to serve as reserve delegates for jurisdictional conference.

Other action taken by the conference was a resolution to merge the Memphis and Tennessee conferences. This was passed by both conferences by written ballot. We will meet as a unified conference in 2021.

Appointments of clergy are set each year at Annual Conference, and these are available on the conference website. The clergy assigned to FUMC Cookeville, are Rev. Dr. Kevin Conrad, Rev. Rob Wheeler, and Rev. Adam Daniels.
